

"From the GM's Desk" 8th February 2018



Following the recent press release calling for the release of water held for environmental purposes by the Commonwealth Environmental Water Holders Office the Mayor and I have had discussions with the Acting Commonwealth Environmental Water Holder Mark Taylor regarding the matter. We have arranged to meet with him and any available representatives of Central Darling, Brewarrina and Walgett Councils in Dubbo on the 15th February 2018.

In the brief discussions I have had with Mark he indicated that there are a number of factors to consider prior to making such a release. While our discussions will focus on the current situation it may provide the opportunity to develop a strategy that would enable releases to take place when we find the river in a similar situation with flows across all weirs servicing the towns at a standstill.

Cobar Shire Council hosted a meeting of all councils in the Orana Regional Organisation of Councils (OROC) to a seminar on Joint Organisation of Councils (JOCs) as the date for Councils to make a decision as to their membership of a JO draws nearer.

Tim Hurst the Acting Chief Executive of the Office of Local Government and Melisa Gibbs the Director of Innovation were the presenters. Shaun McBride a Senior Policy Advisor from Local Government New South Wales was also in attendance to ensure that information relayed at the seminar was able to be disseminated to other Councils if appropriate.

Ten of the twelve Councils in (OROC) were represented and each had the opportunity to raise a number of questions in relation to the formation and operation of the JOs.

With the exception of those Councils in the Far West Planning Region, Councils can only form a JO with Councils within their own planning region. Bourke Shire is located within the Far West Planning Region.

Currently there are two (2) Regional Organisations of Councils (ROCs) in the Orana Central West Planning Region and whether these develop into JOs along the same boundaries is yet to be fully determined. There are Councils in each of the current ROCs who have already indicated that they will not be joining a JO.

The Mayor Councillor Barry Hollman, who is Vice President of Western Division Councils and Councillor Victor Bartley, also made the trip to Broken Hill on Monday for a meeting of the Western Division Councils regarding the plans of the member Councils of that organisation in relation to potential membership of a JO. Together with members of Staff and other Councillors I took the opportunity to join the seminar via video conference as did representatives of Walgett and Cobar Shire. Next week sees the start of the Community Consultation Meetings with meetings scheduled across the Shire. The timetable for the meetings is as follows

Council hosted Nick and Jenny White from the NSW Regional Infrastructure team last week when they visited Bourke as part of their tour of Western New South Wales. Council took the opportunity to detail our strategic priorities. Council also took the opportunity to highlight the problems presented by the large area covered by Council and the duplication of services throughout the area. It was noted that all towns required a reliable water supply and other basic amenities such as a Hall, Waste Disposal facility, street lighting, cemetery and sealed streets Those villages only accessible via unsealed roads needed a sealed airstrip and lighting to cater for medical emergencies. The provision of these facilities is important but all come at a cost.
