Closure of 3G Mobile Network

As of the publication of this column, it is only four (4) days till Telstra and Optus close down their 3G networks, effective 28 October 2024. Time is rapidly running out for existing 3G users in the community to act and ensure they stay connected once the 3G network is closed.

To their credit, both Telstra and Optus have been active for an extended period of time in seeking to raise public awareness of the impending 3G network closures. Whilst it is understood that following upgrade works across the nation, 4G coverage now matches the 3G network, the final public awareness step is to make sure that phone users aren't using 3G network only devices or have a 4G mobile phone that require a 3G network to make calls to Triple Zero.

Mobile phone users are reminded that they can check their device compatibility by visiting https://amta.org.au/3g-closure-old/check-my-device/ or by texting the number '3' to 3498, whereupon they will receive a text back advising if they need to take any action.

Over recent months it is further understood that telecommunication companies have been contacting customers that they have been able to identify as using one of these devices to let them know they will likely need to upgrade. Using the SMS checker will help confirm this. Additionally, in a small number of cases, some people may already have a 4G voice and data capable device, but they have their network settings locked to 3G only, meaning they won't be able to access 4G coverage. This can be easily resolved by changing the phone network settings to include 4G.

In addition, in recent months, some 17,000 free mobile phones have been provided to Telstra customers who are in difficult situations, live rurally or are elderly. These are customers who may need some external support transition when the 3G network closes, to ensure they're able to stay connected after the 3G closure. Bus Flashing Lights

By law in NSW, to protect children that are being picked up or dropped off by a bus, drivers must not overtake or pass a bus with flashing lights at more than 40km/h. Lights on the bus begin to flash when the bus stops and the doors open. The lights keep flashing for about 20 seconds until after the doors close. Children are most at risk in the minutes after they get off the bus.

Young children are often unpredictable in their movements. They are still developing the skills that help them to judge the direction of sound and the speed and distance of vehicles. Motorists can help reduce the risk of a crash and keep children safe by:

- slowing down to 40km/h when bus lights are flashing, unless a lower speed limit applies.
- looking out for children crossing the road near bus stops, in school zones or along bus routes.
- giving way to buses when they merge back into traffic.

Carers and families have a most important part to play in keeping children safe around roads. Please don't drop off or meet your child on the opposite side of the road to the bus stop or call them across the road. Always drop them off or meet them on the same side of the road as the bus stop. Remind your children to always wait until the bus has gone before choosing a safe place to cross the road.

Talk to your children about Stop! Look! Listen! Think! every time they cross the road:

- Stop one step back from the kerb.
- Look continuously both ways.
- Listen for the sounds of approaching traffic.
- Think whether it is safe to cross and keep checking until safely across.

Bourke Promotion

Regular Readers of this Column may recall an article from one of my columns in July 2024 where I wrote of the power of both social and mainstream media, as Council sought to fill the then vacant position of Captain of the PV Jandra. Both articles celebrate Bourke and its many tourist attractions, including the Back O' Bourke Information and Exhibition Centre, Bourke's River history, the PV Jandra cruise, and Toorale and Gundabooka National Parks. They also recommended accommodation spots in town such as the Mitchell Caravan Park for easy town access, Kidman's Camp for proximity to the Jandra, nearby bridges, walking trails, Mount Oxley, the Percy Hobson Mural, and various local farm stays.
